#### **Photography Documents Holocaust Memorials**

Fred N. Katz, DO is well-known to many for his decades of volunteerism in the Jewish community in Atlanta as well as his teaching of radiology. Over the last decade, he has spent thousands of hours documenting a personal mission and has completed an important contribution to preserving the memory of those who perished in the Holocaust, as he photographed more than 100 Holocaust memorials around the world.

"I have loved photography since I was a kid," Dr. Katz shared, "I remember, as a child, taking over the bathroom of our apartment, to develop rolls of film. Eventually, we moved to a home with a basement, and I could use an enlarger to develop my own prints. After I retired from an active radiology practice, I spent three months at the Rocky Mountain School of Photography honing my skills."

During his retirement, Dr. Katz had the time and the means to do a lot of traveling, which enabled him to write this book. He retired in 1998 and then taught half-time at the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine in Suwanee, GA. He and his late wife, Doris, traveled the United States in a motorhome in addition to many trips abroad. He added, "There is a saying that 'when one door closes, another one opens. That was what happened to me during COVID. For over an entire year, my wife Marcy, and I stayed home in Florida, where I spent thousands of hours on my computer sorting through images and writing this book."

He added, "I have been profoundly moved by many of the memorials I have visited. Of course, Yad Vashem, in Israel, is in a category by itself, as the ultimate memorial to the Holocaust. The concentration camp that affected me most was the Mauthausen Concentration Camp memorial in Austria. I believe the Miami Holocaust memorials and the Liberator Memorial on Liberty Island

in New Jersey are the most impressive monuments in the United States."

He said, "One of the most inspirational moments during my journey was when I met an elderly woman at the Treblinka Concentration Camp Memorial. She was standing behind a large stone, with the words, 'Never Again,' engraved on it. She appeared to be praying. I approached her to ask if she minded that I photographed her. She told me that she was her visiting Treblinka, with a group of German Christians, praying for forgiveness for the murder of six million Jewish people. I learned from that experience and others, that we cannot blame all Germans, or all Poles, for the Holocaust, but only the perpetrators. But we cannot ever forget!"

Dr. Katz said, "I hope that the readers will be interested enough to actually go and visit some of these very important and poignant memorials, to pay homage to the millions of people that were murdered during the Holocaust, and to realize that antisemitism and racism can lead to catastrophic results."

Fred Katz, DO was President of GOMA in 1976.

**Karen Vega, DO Celebrates Hispanic Heritage Month** 



Although 19% of people in the U.S. are Latino or Hispanic, that share drops to 6% or so among doctors. This disparity is especially pronounced for Latinas, who make up just 2% of America's physicians. But it's not only Latinas who suffer as a result of being underrepresented in medicine. Research shows that physicians of Latino or Hispanic origin are more likely to practice in underserved areas and speak Spanish. As the U.S. commemorates Hispanic Heritage Month (9/15 to 10/15 each year) for the 35th year, we meet one of PCOM Georgia's newest faculty members.

Meet Karen Vega, DO, an assistant professor of osteopathic medicine at PCOM Georgia. She graduated from Hunter College of the City University of New York and the Touro College of Osteopathic Medicine, Middletown, New York, Dr. Vega completed a residency in osteopathic neuromusculoskeletal medicine in 2023 in the Bronx, her hometown. October 31st (no, it's not a trick)



The Georgia Medicaid program under the Georgia Department of Community Health (DCH) has identified a large number facility, physician, and provider locations that were past due for revalidation.

**Good News!** Due to the advocacy of the Georgia Osteopathic Medical Association and others in our primary care coalition, **the revalidation deadline for these locations has been moved back to October 31, 2023.** After that date the location/physician/facility will be suspended.

Please spend time validating your Medicaid eligibility. <u>Here is a list of doctors that need to revalidate (as of September 5th)</u>.

Effective November 1, 2023, DCH will suspend the enrollment of providers who have failed to revalidate their enrollment.

Suspended providers will not be able to participate in the Georgia Medicaid/PeachCare for Kids programs. Suspension will result in no payment of services provided at that location.

Further, after 30 days, a new Medicaid provider enrollment application must be completed for that location to continue in the Medicaid program.



# **Recognizing National Physician Suicide Awareness Day**



In September 2021, legislators brought forward bills in the House and Senate to recognize Sept. 17 as "National Physician Suicide Awareness Day." The bills were a bipartisan effort to highlight the importance of destigmatizing physicians who seek mental health care and recognize the ongoing, devastating number of physicians lost each year to suicide.

Although recent strains on health care systems nationwide have prompted greater awareness of this crisis outside of medicine, physician burnout and suicide have often been a silent problem in the profession for decades. The United States loses approximately 300 - 400 doctors to suicide annually. These deaths are a tragedy by any measure, and doubly so when preventive measures can be taken legislatively, institutionally and personally.

Many of us have friends or peers who have completed suicide, and some may even have personal experiences with suicidal thoughts. Physicians may perceive themselves as alone with these struggles, not knowing that they are relatively common in the profession.

Annually, *JAMA* has an appendix to a fall issue that gives statistics about graduate medical education. It is obvious that osteopathic physicians are occupying more residency slots now than they did six years ago. Nationwide, there are 12,930 programs (up from 10,909) and 154,231 residents (up from 130,545) of which 36,041 are PGY-1 residents without prior GME (up from 29,427). Currently, DOs make up 26,985 of the residents equaling 17.5% (up from 12.2%) compared to US trained MDs equaling 59.7% and internationally trained MDs equaling 22.7%. The osteopathic physicians dominate the Osteopathic neuromuscular medicine residencies with 97.6% (one US MD & one International MD). Not surprisingly, nationwide DOs mostly gravitate towards primary care specialties (percentage of residents of that specialty trainees that are DOs): Family Medicine 34.2%; Emergency

Medicine 28.4%; Psychiatry 18.7%; Pediatrics 17.9%; Obstetrics and Gynecology 16.4%; and some specialties Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation 37.4%; Transitional Year 25.4%; Hospice & Palliative Medicine 19.6%; Anesthesiology 18.4%.

Georgia does not have as many residency programs or resident physicians compared most other states. In fact, Georgia ranks ahead of only twelve other states in number of resident physicians per 100,000 population with 29/100,000. Total number of Georgia programs is 253 residency programs and training 3204 resident physicians. Annually, we use a few monthly issues to welcome the newest DOs who are doing their residencies in Georgia. Last year, there were 143 osteopathic physicians doing their internship in Georgia. We start with a list of interns located in the metro Atlanta hospitals:

**Emily Wilson, OMS-3 from PCOM South Georgia Honored** with Surgery Award




